One of the issues surrounding Christian faith that is becoming evident in Western Christianity (Europe and the US) is what is being called practical atheism. Practical atheism is where one intellectually acknowledges the existence of God but then lives day to day as if there is no God. It is a failure of the individual to place the practices and morals of Christian faith as a central part of their daily practice. If I might be so blunt, while there is a mental acknowledgement of God, in practical living these individuals live like citizens of Hell instead of the Kingdom of God. We saw evidence of some of this as we emerged from Covid. After being forced into seclusion for weeks to years some individuals who would proclaim themselves as Christian suddenly found that not going to church to gather as the body of Christ was not something they missed all that much. Time that had once been given in devotion to God could now be spent on something else. While the argument might be made that streaming services can be utilized, it isn't the same. I would hazard a guess that many times while streaming is being watched other activities are happening as well, something else is playing on the tv or phone, work is being caught up, meals are being fixed, another cup of coffee is consumed or some other activity that distracts us from giving God our full attention. While I am grateful for streaming services and the option they offer for those who are consistently unable to join with a group because of health or work complications and for those occasional times of vacation or other activities, streaming is not the same as being present with a group of fellow worshippers. I realize that the make-up of what this group looks like is changing. Small groups or house churches are becoming an increasingly popular mode of worship. This is still a group of worshippers come together and is how the early church often organized. But it isn't just church attendance that is indicative of this practical atheism. We see it in road rage from a car displaying a Christian fish emblem on the car. We hear it in the way we talk to one another even in public places. We see it in the t-shirts we wear that promote attitudes which would not be what Jesus would do. We see it played out in business practices led by those who would proclaim a belief in Jesus. We see it in political maneuverings, both sides of the aisle, from those who claim Jesus but their treatment of others doesn't match. We see it from those who claim Jesus but cheat on tests, bully others, take things that aren't theirs or are just plain mean.

Bishop Cardinal Robert Sarah's gave a talk on June 13th in which he warned against liberalizing values that have taken hold in European and western nations. He warned the audience of the dangers of not solely cultural leftism, but also the casualty and 'practicality,' of placing the faith aside, and failing to position faith as the central tenet of one's identity. The Archbishop emeritus of Conakry (Guinea) explained how the tenants of 'practical atheism,' do not explicitly reject the supremacy of Christ, but rather promote a lukewarm version of Christianity that does not place God at the center of daily life and the universe. He explained the danger of liberalization and increasing "paganization," expressing concern for the future and direction of European Christendom. The African Archbishop also outlined the importance and teaching of Pope Benedict XVI, who first formally mentioned the term "Practical Atheism" in a speech given near St. Peter's Square. In that speech, Pope Benedict made clear the dangers of atheism. "A particularly dangerous phenomenon for faith has arisen in our times: indeed, a form of atheism exists which we define, precisely, as 'practical', in which the truths of faith or religious rites are not denied but are merely deemed irrelevant to daily life, detached from life, pointless," Sarah quoted from a 2012 address by Pope Benedict. "So it is that people often believe in God in a superficial manner, and live 'as though God did not exist' (etsi Deus non daretur)." (excerpt taken from Cardinal Sarah: 'Paganization' Threatens Future of European Christendom - Juicy Ecumenism) Beloved let this not be true of us. Let us not only believe about God in our intellect but do all in our power to proclaim our faith in God in how we daily live. Christian faith is meant to be lived out in practical day to day evidence not absence.
