Over the past few months one of the things God has been impressing on me is the importance of prayer in relationship to what we do as a church. If we are not covering all we do as a church with prayer, we are frankly spinning our collective wheels. I think this is especially applicable when we gather together on Sunday mornings for worship. This is a primary time when we pause and listen for God to speak, when we sing our praises and share fellowship with each other. If we are not covering this time with prayer, we are missing the mark. The situation we have is that we do not have any room in our Sunday schedule to intentionally take time before worship to pray. So, the Lord has been impressing on my heart a need to change our worship time in order to make time for us to pray. He has so laid it upon my heart that I believe if we do not do this, if I do not lead us into this change, I, and we, will be disobedient to what God is wanting to accomplish in us. I so not want to be disobedient. I have also come to believe that this is a first step of obedience and God is waiting to show us what is next until we are obedient to this step. I believe God has some good things he is waiting to pour out on us, but our receiving those blessings are contingent on our obedience. This has been on my heart for some time now and I have learned over the years that when something like this doesn't go away it is something that I have to act on. I do not do this lightly or on a whim. I know how hard change is and it seems especially when we change something to do with worship. But, we need to be obedient. So, starting December 1st, our worship time will move to 10:30. Sunday School will stay at 9 and end at 9:55. Those who want to pray will gather in the prayer room at the head of the stairs in the educational wing by the elevator. We will first pray for those who will be on the chancel during worship; speaker, musicians, choir and any others who might have a role in leading worship. We will release musicians and choir for warm up around 10:10. Those remaining will then pray for all who will be in the sanctuary, that they might receive what God has for them that day, for open ears and obedient hearts. Also starting at 10 will be a greeting/ hospitality time in the main hallway and fellowship hall. There will be coffee, hot chocolate, hot cider and water available to drink as you visit one another. On the third Sundays we will also have baked goods. In December Sheila will be providing cinnamon rolls. YUMMM. Another part of what God has been impressing on me about prayer is the prayer garden on the north side of the church. I am working with others to bring some renovation to the area to make it available throughout the year as a quiet place to slip away for some prayer. More details will come as we see where God is leading. Also, Melissa is starting a prayer walk on the IUK campus, details available at church office. I know change is hard, but any step of obedience to the Lord involves change. From our initial moment of salvation all throughout our sanctification, until we see Jesus in glory, obedience means change. Let us embrace this change with grace. So, mark your calendar, starting December 1st, which is the start of Advent and a new church year, worship will begin at 10:30. Still come at 10 to pray, enjoy the hospitality time and eagerly anticipate what God is going to do. Blessings, Pastor Keith

Fish Fry Report: God truly blessed us through the 2024 Fish Fry. While the weatherman said close to an 80% chance of rain in the early morning, by noon, the report was a 15% chance. We did have showers near the end of the fry – but no fierce wind and storms! The people came – the "plate count indicates 743, our largest crowd in a number of years – and they ate a won-derful meal, and stayed and enjoyed good community fellowship. And they stayed, and stayed, and..... \Box The shortage of seating was the BEST problem to have! Our fry raised a total of \$9,229.75 that will be divided among the mission committee's designated organizations, to include:

\$2768.93 Hillsdale/Zion Food Pantry	\$922.98 Adam & Carly Wertz
\$1845.95 Kokomo Rescue Mission	\$922.98 Joy in the Harvest
\$1845.95 Valley of Grace	\$922.98 Kafakumba Training Center

Beyond the record money given, please allow me to share some highlights from this year's fry from the perspective of the coordinators.

- The **ALL** of our expenses were covered by donations from our faithful congregation (\$147 profit was already in the books before the fish hit the oil!).
- We had a great representation of **YOUNG ADULTS**, **YOUTH and CHILDREN** helping during the fish fry!
- We had soon-to-be 97-year-old Judy Winger bringing home-baked cookies. And on the other end of the spectrum, we had soon-to-be 4-year-old Theo Gamble – with plastic gloves to his armpits, learning to "bruise the cabbage" and mix coleslaw. (the technique handed down and taught to my generation by Carolyn Donson's mother, Marjorie Keim).
- While several families had multi-generations of their family working -- Winifred Wyant had 4 GENERATIONS OF HER FAMILY – all working together at the fish fry!!
- Jeff Gamble stepped up on behalf of Peru McDonalds (north 31) to help with paper and condiment products.
- We had the use of Lisa & Kevin Smith's concession trailer and golf cart to make the drivethru line efficient.
- The ice-cream center was well received and the rental of the machine was donated by Hochstedler & Sons, LLC.

The camaraderie of the crew was amazing as everyone pitched in to make it all work.

To everyone who helped in any way – through generous giving, labor, prayer – LeAnne & I can't say it loud enough -- <u>THANK YOU</u>! *God continues to do great things at Zion*!!

Child Evangelism Fellowship- from Pam Hall

y teammates and I in Indianapolis want to reach all kids of course, but my team members and I have a special burden for unchurched kids.



These unchurched children hunger for the Truth. In one particular club, a brother and a sister would come to the teachers after the Bible lesson, not because they wanted to receive Jesus as Savior, but because they had so many questions. These children came from a religiously diverse family, and they longed to make sense of all the conflicting ideas being taught in their home.

"Is Jesus real?"

"If He is, is He really the Son of God?"

"Where does the Bible say that?"

With so many questions and so little time, the teachers had to carefully study the Bible, so they were prepared to answer their questions. One teacher had the brilliant idea of writing down verse references for them on sticky notes. The children handled those sticky notes like they were gold!

God used these experiences to show the team members how valuable His Word is. However, they are not the only ones who have tasted and seen the beauty of God's Word.

Before she started coming to *Good News Club**, Jane* had never heard of the Bible. A GNC^{**} volunteer gave Jane her first copy of the New Testament. Sometimes children lose their Bibles or forget to bring them to club, but Jane took her new gift seriously. Every week, she would return with her Bible, telling the team leader how much she enjoyed reading it. She also

came back ready to recite her memory verse and show her completed Quiet Time sheets. One week, Jane opened her New Testament to show the teachers she had read up to Luke 18. That day, the team learned how she had gotten so far in her reading. At her public school, students could take out any book they desired for reading time. Jane could have been reading any other book during this time, but she chose to pull out the Bible the greatest book of all time—and read it of her own free will.

For this unchurched girl who had never heard of the Bible to have an interest and willingness to dive in and grab hold of each thing and demonstrate what it meant to her was so encouraging to all of us.

My team and I pray that Jane's hunger and thirst for the Word will continue, and that she will be connected to a Bible-believing church.

AN UNQUENCHABLE APPETITE—EXCESSIVE OR NORMAL?

Jane developed an unquenchable appetite for the Word of God. It seemed she was reading it at every opportunity—drinking in its truths and being comforted by its promises. Scripture clearly tells us that newborn believers have an innate hunger for the Word of God. Do you recall that hunger in your own spiritual walk? Do you recall a time when it was easy for you to spend time with the Lord and never grow tired of hearing from Him? Babies have an innate desire for milk. They cry when they cannot get it because they crave the nutrients it provides. Scripture tells us that we should have an unquenchable appetite for truth. It may start with milk, but then we should graduate to meat. Doctors tell us that a loss of appetite is a normal part of sickness. Is it possible that a reduced appetite for truth is an indication of spiritual "sickness" that can only be reversed by the intake of the Word of God? Today, I encourage you to take seriously your time with God. Cherish it. Drink in the truths that can satisfy your soul. Claim the promises that can give you hope. Obey the commands that give you direction for life.
